This Quartet has volunteered a combined 146 years at the Spencerville OES donut stand. It takes 150 people (eight working fivehour shifts at a time) to perform the various tasks to make these donuts. Today we have several local Masonic Lodges and Eastern Star Chapters along with several non-profit organizations to help make donuts.

The Concord Lodge has truly been molded into the cornerstone of success of this donut trailer! These men helped create the design of our new trailer, and are responsible for all the wonderful new upgrades that help us make the donuts faster and trouble free. This year at fair, Fair Committee Chairman Terri Rosenbury honored these four Masons with "Old Fart Donut Crew" shirts and thanked them for their 146 combined years of service.

The Spencerville OES used the proceeds of this event to support their 26 Community Service projects.
