





Masonic History of the Indiana Masonic Home

1906 – The Masonic Grand Lodge decided to set about building a Masonic Home for Master Masons and their widows and orphans. They sent out a questionnaire to all the Lodges within 45 miles of Indianapolis to see if they had a place that met all the requirements for a home.

1907- After the fire of the Grand Lodge building on Washington Street in Indianapolis, they decided to build a new building at their present location on Illinois Street at a cost of \$333,000.

1908 – After receiving back the questionnaires from the lodges, they decided that Franklin best met all the requirements for a home. They decided to buy a 215 acre farm and several other pieces of property that made up a 223 acre tract. They decided to install a spur off the railroad onto the property and an administrative building, a power house, a girls cottage, a boys cottage, a hospital (the money donated by Eastern Star was used to build the hospital) and a tool shed at a cost of \$223,000. At the time, they only had \$179,000.00. With the donation of \$32,000.00 from Eastern Star and a \$20,000.00 donation from the Franklin Lodge, they were able to complete the project.

1915 – With completion of the railroad spur and with enough infrastructures and with the foundation of the Administration building finished, the cornerstone was laid on October 21, 1915.

On October 21, 1916 it was reported that 60 residents were living at the Home. By April, 1917, there were 34 Master Masons, 3 wives of Master Masons, 12 widows of Masons, 5 boys, 4 girls and 2 Eastern Star members.

Building the Masonic Home

The Building Committee met at the office of the Grand Secretary on Monday, May 24 for final consideration of a revisited plat plan for the locations of the buildings in the Home Village. The Architect presented three different plans of a rectangular and circular arrangement of the buildings on the campus. All buildings were to be facing the circle and surrounding the Main or Administration building.

After much consideration, the committee adopted the circular plan and ordered the architect to proceed immediately with the detailed plans for the location of the buildings in accordance with the General Plan adopted. It was decided at this time that the buildings to be completed at the present time are the administration or main building which will be two stories with basement and attic and accommodating fifty elderly residents, two matrons, Superintendent's quarters, two guest rooms, employee's quarters, a general dining room and kitchen, general storage and an auditorium capable of seating three hundred. The estimated cost of this building was \$91,000.00.

Also planned was one single cottage for boys which would consist of two stories and a basement; which would include a study room, recreation room, and toilets on the first floor. A dormitory, bath and matron's room would be on the second floor. The basement would include a swimming pool, play rooms and storage room. The capacity of this building would be thirty boys and a matron. The cost would be \$13,500.00. A single cottage would house the girls and would be a duplicate of the boy's cottage, with the exception that there will be private bedrooms for the older girls instead of a general dormitory. There would be no swimming pool in the basement, but larger playrooms and increased bathing facilities on the second floor. The capacity would be the same and the estimated cost would be \$13,000.00.

A Hospital building would consist of one story with a basement. This hospital would have private rooms for the adults, two dormitories for the boys and girls, nurse rooms, and a dining room and kitchen. At each end of the building, and a part of it will be glazed in, there will be convalescent rooms. This building would be built and furnished with money contributed by the Eastern Star and will be known as the Eastern Star Hospital. It will accommodate twenty patients and its estimated cost is \$13,000.00.

The power house will be a one story building of similar construction and in harmony with the other buildings of the village. It will be equipped with boilers, pumps, electric generators and will include steam lines to the original building. The estimated cost is \$25,000.00.

The service building will be a one story and basement building, harmonious with its surrounding. It will contain the laundry, bakery and cold storage plant. The estimated cost of this building with its equipment is \$10,000.00.

It was a thought of the committee that the equipment for the bakery and cold storage would not be installed until future requirements will make it cheaper to produce than to purchase the supplies. Neither has a separate water supply and system completed, and at this time they could purchase water from the Franklin service for our initial plant at a lower rate than we can produce it at the present time.

The first thing constructed was the railroad spur on the grounds to move in construction material and coal for the power house at a cost of \$2,800.00.

More Indiana Masonic Home history will follow in upcoming issues.

Tuesday was the formal opening. From then on, their actions were much the same as ours. The Grand Representatives Luncheon, held in the cafeteria, was in the afternoon. I was asked to give the tribute to the American Flag. My counterpart gave the tribute to the Canadian Flag. That was neat! Many Representatives brought favors to pass out. I used Indiana shaped cookie cutters with a sugar cookie recipe attached. They seemed to like them.

Wednesday morning brought the election of officers. In their jurisdictions, everyone registered has a vote. Nominations are from the floor for any attending member. There were two nominations for Associate Grand Conductress from the members at large. Credentials were as follows: 210 voting members and 120 visiting members. Nova Scotia has 24 chapters. Prince Edward Island has 3 chapters. So their Grand Chapter consists of 27 Chapters. Installation was held Wednesday evening.

I did notice some of the verbiage is different that ours. To my counterpart, I am her reciprocal. When calling for a vote, the words "in favor or contrary mined" are used. Instead of using the word bonding, they use "crime of fidelity".

All in all, we had a wonderful trip and it was interesting to see the slight differences in our meetings. I can't say enough about Doris and Frank Cullen. I count them as dear friends now. And it was Sister Tina and Brother Larry who made this possible for me. Thank you so much.

GREETINGS FROM YOUR BOARD OF GRAND TRUSTEES

As I sit here and write to you, my Sisters and Brothers, it is a beautiful 60-degree day in early November. I just hope that when you are reading this we are not "paying for" the awesome good weather we are enjoying now!

Your Grand Trustees work hard at each of our meetings to best handle the finances of our Grand Chapter. One of the biggest challenges we face is negotiating and paying for the contracts for our Grand Chapter sessions. The purpose of this writing is to help you to understand some of the changes and decisions that have been made for the 2017 and 2018 sessions at the Marriott.

Grand Chapter has a "number of room nights" commitment and a "food and beverage" commitment. We have had no problem meeting the number of room nights required. But two out of the last four years (since I have been serving on the Board) we have fallen short of the food and beverage commitment.

The first time, the Board was notified Friday afternoon of Grand Chapter. There was an "emergency meeting" of the board and the event manager, and it was agreed to order more food for the Friday night party in order to meet our contract. Last year we were notified the week before the session that based on the number of meal reservations at that time, we had commitments for less than \$28,000 of the \$32,366 contract. Reservations were down by 141. More food had to be ordered. Therefore, the soup and salad were included with the Saturday lunch buffet. The "free to the members" Saturday morning coffee, donuts, and bagels were added, at a cost of \$2,510.64. Grand Chapter also paid for half the price of the Saturday buffet. This additional food made up the difference, and we met our commitment.

The Board was able to renegotiate the contracts for the next two years. We were able to get the food and beverage requirement greatly reduced. But as a result, the room rates have gone up from \$109 to \$114 per night.

I tell you all of this as a "heads up" to help you understand some of what is involved in setting up our sessions. Grand Chapter needs your participation and support in order to meet our contracts. The event manager has said that there will be more menu choices for the luncheons and dinners at our next session. And I have personally complained for the past four years about the "uncooked green beans" served at our luncheons and dinners! I am keeping my fingers crossed for better cooking results next session.

I hope this information has been helpful to you. Our membership has to work together in order to have a successful Grand Chapter session. I look forward to seeing you in June and breaking bread with you. Until then,
