85 YEAR MEMBER!

Deloris Morrison Fleck probably set several records on her 106th birthday November 11, 2013. She is the oldest resident at Heritage Pointe in Warren where she has lived since 1994. It was her 85th year as a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and O.E.S. dignitaries were on hand to celebrate with her at Heritage Pointe.

Judy Klemm, District #14 Deputy, presented an 85th-year certificate signed by Elizabeth Lashley, Indiana Worthy Grand Matron, and Darrell Arthur, Indiana Worthy Grand Patron. Present at the presentation was a delegation from her Columbia City Chapter #65 – Romona Dunfee, Worthy Matron; Chet Simon, Worthy Patron; and Joan Simon, Secretary – as well as Mary Alice (Dunwoody) Laymon of Montpelier, wearing her 50-year O.E.S. pin. Mary Alice is a niece of Mrs. Fleck. Also present were Carolyn Jevelian of Wilmette, Illinois, and George Fleck of Williamsburg, Massachusetts, children of Deloris Fleck.

Deloris was born at the Morrison Homestead, south of Warren in Salamonie Township. She attended the one-room Zent School, a short walk from her home, and then entered Warren High School, graduating in 1925. She completed the teacher preparation course of Indiana State Normal School at Muncie, now Ball State University, in 1927, and received an Indiana lifetime teacher's license in 1932. Manchester College, now Manchester University, awarded her the B.S. degree in 1964.

She spent most of her quarter century career in education as a Hoosier fourth grade teacher. She taught elementary school at the Salamonie School in Warren from 1927 to 1932. That building, built in 1925, has been restored as Warren's Knight-Bergmann Civic Center. She then taught a year at the Washington Center School in Whitley County. Deloris returned to elementary teaching when her children were growing up, teaching at South Whitley from 1951 to 1955, at Ligonier from 1955 to 1959, and at the Thorncreek Township School in Whitley County from 1959 until her retirement in 1970.

Deloris married Ford Bloom Fleck on June 6, 1933. Mr. Fleck, a science teacher at Warren, South Whitley, Ligonier and Columbia City, died on July 2, 1983.

A Past Matron in the Order of the Eastern Star, Mrs. Fleck was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Columbia City until it closed in May 2009. She is presently the oldest member of the First Presbyterian Church of Wilmette, Illinois.

Churubusco Chapter #136 donated \$800.00 to Cole Lybarger and the Churubusco Jr. Sr. High School Destination ImagiNation teams for their travel and participation in the Global Finals as part of OES Community Support of the Community Outreach Program.

Cole along with 12 other students of Churubusco Jr. Sr. High School participated in the Destination ImagiNation Global Finals May 21st through May 25th in Knoxville, TN at the University of Tennessee. The two teams, one Jr. High team and one Sr. High team, competed against teams from 44 states, 11 countries and 6 Canadian provinces. Destination ImagiNation is the world's largest creativity festival where over 20,000 attended. The DI program fosters creativity, problem solving and teamwork. Both teams earned the opportunity to participate after winning the championship at Regional and State competitions in April.

The Jr. High team, of which Cole was a member, won at the State level in the challenge "In Disguise". This challenge involved a silent skit where a mask is worn and must morph into a mask with another meaning. The catch was the team was not able to speak in the skit or use written language on the props. The team had to complete the skit within 6 minutes. This was the first year at Globals for this team. They came in 47 out of 83 teams.

The Sr. High team competed in the "Real to Reel" challenge. The team had to conduct an outreach project that benefited the community and then develop a skit to present their project. They raised funds and made 29 fleece blankets that they donated at Christmas to Lutheran Children's Hospital in Fort Wayne. Their skit was about Santa's elves going on strike. The elves were convinced to be good by watching a newscast about the DI team project. This team has been to the Global Finals several times and this year enjoyed a top ten performance by winning 6th place against 50 other teams. Both teams participated in the Instant Challenge where they were given a task that had to be completed within a short amount of time. This challenge had to be kept a secret as several teams had the same challenge.

The teams also participated in many activities held in the Expo Center including making the tallest marshmallow tower from marshmallows and skewers. Two members of the Jr. High team won the grand prize, reaching a height of 41.5 inches. Two other members made a mock Mars Rover from tape, straws, rubber bands and a Styrofoam cup which had the best time for carrying a payload to its destination.

Pin trading is a big activity and was really fun. Teams bring pins to trade from where they were from. Some pins were highly sought after such as the Mindcraft pin, the California motorcycle pin, dragon pins and wizard pins. The Churubusco teams had eagle pins, which is the school mascot and were a big hit. They had "pin trading areas" where you could trade your pins. It seems that everyone had his or her pins displayed on a "pin towel or blanket". We spent several hours going from table to table trading pins and trading the pins we just traded. The teams brought back pins from China, Korea, Turkey, Singapore, Mexico, Canada and the States.


