Finally, as I travel into your District, know that I am appreciative of everything that you do.






THANKSGIVING FEATHERS

THE HAND

At first it sounded like a Thanksgiving story, but the more I reflected on it, the more appropriate it seemed for any time of the year. The way I heard it, the story went like this:

Thanksgiving Day was near. The first grade teacher gave her class a fun assignment -- to draw a picture of something for which they were thankful.

Most of the class might be considered economically disadvantaged, but still many would celebrate the holiday with turkey and other traditional goodies of the season. These, the teacher thought, would be the subjects of most of her student's art. And they were.

But Douglas made a different kind of picture. Douglas was a different kind of boy. He was the teacher's true child of misery, frail and unhappy. As other children played at recess, Douglas was likely to stand close by her side. One could only guess at the pain Douglas felt behind those sad eyes.

Yes, his picture was different. When asked to draw a picture of something for which he was thankful, he drew a hand. Nothing else. Just an empty hand.

His abstract image captured the imagination of his peers. Whose hand could it be? One child guessed it was the hand of a farmer, because farmers raise turkeys. Another suggested a police officer, because the police protect and care for people. Still others guessed it was the hand of God, for God feeds us. And so the discussion went -- until the teacher almost forgot the young artist himself.

When the children had gone on to other assignments, she paused at Douglas' desk, bent down, and asked him whose hand it was. The little boy looked away and murmured, "It's yours, teacher."

She recalled the times she had taken his hand and walked with him here or there, as she had the other students. How often had she said, "Take my hand, Douglas, we'll go outside." Or, "Let me show you how to hold your pencil." Or, "Let's do this together." Douglas was most thankful for his teacher's hand.

Brushing aside a tear, she went on with her work.

The story speaks of more than thankfulness. It says something about teachers teaching and parents parenting and friends showing friendship, and how much it means to the Douglases of the world. They might not always say thanks. But they'll remember the hand that reaches out.



BIG STAR-LITE NEWS!

Guess who is celebrating 50 Years? STAR-LITE MAGAZINE!!!!

In looking over the issues each month I noticed that this year is the 50th Anniversary of Star-Lite. I have a collection of older issues, but it is not complete. However, I do have a copy of Volume 1, No. 3 for August-September 1964. After that I have nothing until 1980. If anyone has any of these older issues and would like to donate them, I would love to have them for my collection.

Star-Lite began in 1964 with a 16 page magazine the same size as today's issues. The print was much smaller and each page had 2 or 3 columns. The cost for a 10 issue subscription was \$2.00 do-



mestic and \$2.50 foreign, but printing and mailing costs were much less back then. The cover had a different graphic and was purple.

Inside the cover are the names, addresses and phone numbers of the Grand Officers and District Deputies. An interesting note is that there were no area codes and many of the phone numbers still had letters at the beginning instead of all numbers. The Editorial Committee was listed as Sallie Turner - Advisor, Norma Hamilton - Editor and Maxine Moser - Assistant Editor. The Grand Trustees listed were Helen Houser - Chairman, David J. Miller and Helen Garriott.

The WGM was Peggy Scott and WGP was Aaron Elliott. The WGM wrote a letter at the beginning of the issue, much like today. Other letters included were from the Grand Secretary, Editor, Co-Editor and the Most Worthy Grand Patron. Every district had submitted at least one article for the issue that I have. There is only 1 picture and it is of Sallie Turner for her AGM reception article.

There were many reception articles along with an interesting article describing New Jersey's Grand

Chapter session as attended by Gay Brown, Grand Representative of New Jersey in Indiana and Norma Hamilton, Editor. Mooresville Chapter #260 celebrated its 64th Anniversary, Twelve Mile Chapter #557 observed its 25th Anniversary and Osceola Chapter #598 was constituted. District meetings were reported as were special meetings honoring District Deputies and special members from various chapters.

It has a section for news from the Masonic Home that stated it has sheltered 3,476 men, women and children since it had opened its doors 48 years earlier. "The present population of the Home totals 436, including 115 Master Masons, 16 wives, 164 widows, 125 Eastern Stars and 16 children."

All the inspections for the entire year were listed by the Districts and there were 80 scheduled compared to 64 today.

It is interesting to look back and read some of the early issues of Star-Lite. Many who celebrate 50 years of accomplishments think back to when it all began. We remember those times and think of all the changes that have occurred through those years. We realize change is all around us but we still continue on and hope for the best.
